

A warm welcome to 2016 IASL Tokyo. We greatly appreciate your participation. It has been a long-standing dream on my part to be able to form connections with researchers and librarians from school libraries around the world. That dream has come true, here and now, in the form of the 45th Annual Conference of the International Association of School Librarianship (IASL), incorporating the 20th International Forum on Research in School Librarianship.

School libraries in Japan are about to see major changes. The chief aim of school libraries in the past was to provide students with books for reading. Now, however, school libraries serve as places for students' learning activities and for nurturing their information literacy. We are happy to report that a national policy has just provided a budget increase for libraries. A revision of the School Library Act has recently ushered in the new practice of placing both a teacher-librarian and a school librarian in a school library, and this trend continues to gather pace. We are now in the digital age, and school libraries deal not only with books but also with digital materials and Web resources. This combination of circumstances is what prompted us to designate "A School Library Built for the Digital Age" as the conference theme for discussing and speculating on what form future school libraries will take.

Meeting and networking with many people in the same field is, of course, a very important part of a conference. I hope every participant will take full advantage of this opportunity for future studies and friendship. School libraries in Japan have in the past been rather parochial, and up to now have regarded overseas developments only as a source of information. They have been less willing to transmit information overseas. But I hope we can take this opportunity to realize bidirectional transmission of information among many organizations worldwide.

The Japanese have a long-established habit of creating unusual cultural blends, often rooted in the natural beauty of Japan, between native traditions and new ideas from overseas. Wildlife cartoons, called *chôjû-giga*, are one example. They were popular 800 years ago and are said to be the origin of *manga*. In *chôjû-giga*, rabbits, monkeys, frogs and other animals are drawn in lively fashion, showing them disporting themselves like human beings. These homegrown artistic traditions, infused with novel drawing styles from other countries, have led to a kind of 'hybrid vigor' that finds expression, in a very Japanese way, in *manga* as we know them today. *Manga* have become an aspect of Japanese culture that is known all over the world. While you are here, I hope you will find the opportunity to appreciate the traditions of Japan and its beautiful landscapes.



Profile of Keynote Speakers



Mr. ATODA Takashi: August 22

Mr. Atoda is a writer, born in Tokyo in 1935. After graduating Waseda University, he worked at the National Diet Library for a while. He became renowned not only as a witty columnist but also as short-story writer, by his Japanese most famous literary prize, the Naoki Award winning book in 1979 "Napoleon Crazy" that contains his superb short "Raiho-sha", the Japanese most famous Mystery Writers of Japan Award winning work. His works are

characterized by their meticulous attention to detail. He is the best at short-story, writing some long-story, including historical one focusing on ancient Rome and educational series of mythology of the ancient Greeks. He won the Eiji Yoshikawa Prize for Literature in his "New Tales of Troy" in 1995. The Order of the Rising Sun, Gold Rays with Neck Ribbon, and the Medal with Purple Ribbon were awarded to him mainly for his contribution to National language policy. He also served as the 15th Chairman of the Japan P.E.N. Club., and now is the Librarian of Yamanashi Prefectural Library.



Dr. Oberg Dianne: August 23

Dr. Dianne Oberg, Professor Emerita of Alberta University, is a school library educator and researcher. Before becoming a university educator, she had many years of experience as a classroom teacher and a teacher-librarian. Throughout her professional career, she has been actively involved in school library association work. She has served as president of the Learning Resources Council of the Alberta Teachers' Association and of the Canadian School Library

Association. She was the first editor of School Libraries Worldwide, the journal of the International Association of School Librarianship. She was also a chair of School Library Division of International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA).



Ms. SATONAKA Machiko: August 25

Born in Osaka, Ms. Satonaka received the inaugural Kodansha Manga New Faces Award in 1964 (while a second-year high school student) for Pia no Shouzou (Pia's Portrait). Major works include Ashita Kagayaku (Shining Tomorrow), Ariesu no Otome-tachi (Ladies of Aries), Umi no Orora (Aurora of the Sea), Asunaro-Zaka (Cypress Hill), Karyudo no Seiza (Constellation of the

Hunter), and Tenjo no Niji (Rainbow in the Sky). She received many awards of extending areas from the Lifetime Works and Cultural Activities Award by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science, and Technology in 2006, to the Commissioner for Cultural Affairs Award in 2010. Ms. Satonaka serves for the Japan Cartoonists Association as Executive Director of the leadership organization of Manga Japan, and Professor and Dean for the Character Creative Arts Department, Osaka University of Arts.



Dr. Herring James: August 26

Dr. James E Herring taught for 34 years in universities in the UK and Australia. He is the author of 11 books on information literacy, ICT in schools and school libraries. He has presented papers at international conferences, including IASL, in Australia, Canada, USA, France, Spain,

Greece and South Africa. He is an internationally renowned expert on information literacy in schools and on school libraries. Dr. Herring retired from Charles Sturt University, Australia in 2012 but has kept a keen interest in developments in schools and school libraries since then. He is currently engaged in a local history project which uses oral history as a basis for research into his home town of Dunbar in the 1950s. A new book related to this research will be published in 2016. Dr. Herring is a keen cyclist and reader of modern poetry and fiction. He enjoys travelling and photography. He writes a weekly blog at http://jherring.wordpress.com.

Profile of Guest Speakers



Mr. Tatekawa Shinoharu

Mr. Tatekawa Shinoharu is a Rakugo (Japanese traditional comic storytelling) performer born in Osaka, Japan. He moved to New York at the age of eight, and since then, has spent a total of 7 years in the U.S. After graduating from Yale University in 1999, he worked in Mitsui & Co. Ltd for three and a half years. In 2002, he was so greatly impressed and inspired when he attended Shinosuke Tatekawa's Rakugo performance that he decided to give up his corporate position to become a professional Rakugo performer himself by taking up a discipleship with Shinosuke Tatekawa.

After training in the art of Rakugo for eight and a half years, he was promoted to "Futatsume" (a recognized rank for independent Rakugo performers). He performs both traditional stories, and original stories, as well as in English to bring this art form to an international audience. In 2011, he gave his first solo Rakugo performance in Singapore. In 2012, he was invited to the Singapore International Storytelling Festival (SISF), where he was the only Japanese performer featured. Since then, he has been performing in Singapore twice a year.

Presently, he travels around Japan and the world on a mission of bringing laughter to everyone. He has also published three books, including an English Rakugo CD book.



Mr. Kataoka Norio: August 23

Library Research Study Teacher, Head Librarian, Seikyo Gakuen Junior & Senior High School, Osaka. Japan.

Mr. Kataoka has been a judging committee of 'Library Research Competition' by Library Advancement Foundation for 19 years, and Kataoka himself received 'Toshokan no Gakko (School of Libraries)'Special Award in the first competition in 1997 for his research project titled 'Gakko Toshokan wo Riyo Shita Sogo Rika,

Kadai Kenkyu no Jissen' ('Conducting Research Studies in General Science and Effective Use of School Libraries'). In 2013, Kataoka and Seikyo Gakuen Junior & Senior High School Library 'Libraria' was awarded the 44th Japan School Library Association award for their research project "Nandemo Manaberu Gakko Toshokan" wo Tsukuru: Bukku Katarogu & Detashu' ('Making Our Library a "We-Can-Learn-Anything" Space: Lists of Useful Books for Students and Tips for Finding and Sorting Research Topics') and 'Asa no Dokusho Taisho' ('Morning Reading') award by Takahashi Matsunosuke Memorial Honoring Foundation in the following year.

Title: How suitable is Yahoo! Groups for school librarians' professional networking? A case study from Hong Kong

Presenters: Choi, Samson & Dukic, Zvjezdana

Abstract: This paper explores how members of Hong Kong based professional association of school librarians (ALESS) use Yahoo! Groups platform for their professional networking and how the platform satisfies the group's professional needs. The case study research method is applied and both quantitative and qualitative data are collected. It is revealed that ALESS members effectively use Yahoo! Groups platform even though they do not exploit all available features. ALESS members regularly use web-based mail and occasionally Files and Polls. Although some group members think that Yahoo! Groups need to be replaced with a more user-friendly tool, most respondents agree that for the time being Yahoo! Groups platform fairly fulfils ALESS group's needs. Further analysis of existing social networking software and ALESS group's needs and preferences are recommended.

This necessary change led us to explore school library practices through a global lens. This research inquires "what are the similarities in the experiences and practices of school librarians across international boundaries in efforts to meet the needs of 21st century learners?" and more specifically "how do ruling relations impact and shape the experiences and practices of school librarians in Brazil?" Institutional Ethnography methodology is utilized to gain insight into the actualities of professional work lives, while examining the ruling relations that impact the institution...

Title: Curriculum-Engaged School Libraries and Teacher Librarians Value

Curriculum-Alignment of Resources

Presenter: Chadwick, Ben

Abstract: Australian school libraries have an expressed need to organise resources according to Australian Curriculum (AC) outcomes. The Schools Catalogue Information Service (SCIS) at Education Services Australia creates and distributes MARC records to 93% of Australian school libraries, but has not traditionally provided curriculum-alignment data. This paper describes a SCIS survey of 586 Australian school libraries, examining the factors driving demand for curriculum alignment. Libraries with a teacher-librarian and those that were already actively engaged in curriculum resourcing saw the most value in resource alignment. Curriculum-engaged libraries were more prominent in secondary schools, Catholic schools, and large schools with larger libraries and a teacher-librarian. They were also more prominent in

schools where teachers actively engaged with library staff. Library engagement is discussed as a concept of potential interest for further research.

Title: Making and Implementing an Environmental Studies Database for Teacher

Librarians: Metadata Education for Teacher Librarians

Presenters: Imai, Fukuji, Anne McKnight, Kuniharu Tabata & Shinji Iwamasa

Abstract: Metadata encodes important knowledge for school library education. This study framed two questions: 1. How are metadata treated in teacher librarian textbooks? 2. What teaching materials are best for teacher librarians' metadata education? To answer question one, we investigated the regulation of subject and content by Ministry of Education in Japan and we reviewed teacher librarian textbooks. To answer question two, we created an environmental studies database that included geographical metadata, and then surveyed undergraduate students to learn how the database was utilized. In conclusion, we recommend that future studies of metadata examine both how metadata are defined and how metadata are used in particular situations.

Title: "This is the biggest place where you can express your imagination": Information practices of middle school students at a school library makerspace

Presenters: Li, Xiofeng & Todd, Ross

Abstract: This study aims to understand what brought a group of middle students to their school library makerspace, their questions, information practices, and barriers in their participation. Informed by Dervin's sense-making verbing approach and sociocultural approaches to learning, qualitative data were collected through initial interviews, surveys, follow-up interviews, and weekly field observations over six months. The findings show that the school library makerspace was a social and informal learning environment for the students to have fun, be creative and develop skills in science, technology, engineering, mathematics and arts. Their information practices ranged from tinkering with materials and technologies, and getting help from interpersonal resources. This study highlights the information practices at the library makerspace were social in nature, embodied through materials and tools, and embedded in the formal educational system; this study also sheds light on the affordances and constraints of the materials and computers in the students' activities at makerspace.

Title: School Library Design, Facilities and Resources for Sustainable Cognitive and Social Development of Students: An Evaluative Case Study

Presenter: Stewart, Paulette Lisanne

Abstract: The purpose of this study was to examine the circumstances that prompted the school administrators to construct a new library that included modern library spaces, resources and facilities, to find out the strategies used to build the new library and to determine the perceived effects that the new spaces, resources and facilities have on students' cognitive and social development. This research took an evaluative case study approach. Purposive sampling was used to select the school principal, the school librarian and eight students. The principal and school librarian were interviewed and open ended interview schedules were administered to the

students. The findings revealed that the design of the library, the resources and the facilities had a positive impact on students' cognitive and social development. It was recommended that the Ministry of Education Youth and Information re-design or construct similar school libraries on a phase basis because of the positive educational impact.

Title: The challenges of a school library in the digital age as a resource helping educating refugee children and integrating them into the Swedish society

Presenter: Johansson, Per

Abstract: Approximately 163,000 refugees came to Sweden in 2015, mainly from Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria and Somalia. Many of them were just children. These children have faced extreme dangers and endured extreme hardships but once in Sweden they receive a school education. A number of these children have been designated to schools in Spånga, in Stockholm, the capital of Sweden where I work. The absence of parents, language barriers, cultural differences, lack of earlier education along with other challenges must be acknowledged and addressed constructively in order for the school library to make a difference. A school library built for the digital age might give access to thousands of books, modern information technology, Internet and digital resources but it requires of its' users to be literate and to have digital literacy. Many of the children's language- and information and communication technology skills are poor and they are therefore not able to make good use of the school library without help...

Data analytics can help librarians identify which data to collect, how to organize and analyze the data, and make informed recommendations for library improvement. Data analytics based on the California school library survey offer a predictive model for school library program effectiveness. Data analytics based on the American Association of School Librarians survey offers a longitudinal look at school library programs. A sample scenario that addresses one of the key variables provides the basis for employing data analytics to improve services.

Abstract: In Croatian school system it is prescribed by the law that every school should have a library and a professional librarian managing the library and serving the school community. School library is a part of the educational system and school librarian has to be involved in teaching and extracurricular activities. This research explores how school librarians in primary school in Croatia perceive their various roles and what roles related duties they perform in their daily practices. A survey was conducted on a sample of primary school librarians in Croatia and 122 valid responses were collected and analyzed for the purpose of this study. The study findings show that school librarians in primary schools perceive that promotion of students' reading is their most important role while teaching information literacy is less important. School libraries, through their natural connection to storytelling in all its forms, can help foster a culture of empathy and respect, and can play an active role in promoting tolerance within the school community. This paper will focus on the worldwide movement known as The Human Library, which aims to "challenge prejudice through conversation" (Human Library UK 2016a). The Human Library reimagines the concept of a reader opening a book and looking at life through the eyes of 'the other' as they turn the pages, by replacing physical books with 'living books': people from all walks of life who volunteer to be 'borrowed' by a 'reader' for a conversation. Through respectful dialogue, stereotypes can be broken down and empathy can replace stigmatization...

The importance of a cafe in school libraries are revealed from the three point of views; Ibasho, Youth support and Information literacy education. 1) Piccari Café is a value for students not only to add the choices of ibasyo in school but also to let them know about ibasyo outside school. 2) Piccari Café works as a platform for each three levels of prevention interventions: universal, selective, and indicated. 3) Piccari Café potentially provides students information literacy education without teaching. This case revealed that school library with a meeting, learning and creative function has the potential to generate a platform for students to strengthen links with school and society.

Title: Challenges for School Libraries in the digital age: A study on the knowledge seeking pattern among male and female students in Sri Lanka

Presenter: Premadasa, Yashindri Vishnika.

Abstract: Current literature shows that very limited research has been done with respect to young school children and their usage of print and electronic media, which implies its timely importance of such research for the policy makers, educators, libraries, education reformists and the young school children of Sri Lanka. This paper discuss a comparative study that was carried out to investigate the knowledge seeking patterns among students are changing from print to electronic media. The survey was conducted among four schools in Sri Lanka, comprised of a total of 400 students ranging from 14 years (grade nine students) to 18 years (grade thirteen students). Our study showed, 66% of grade nine students, 77% of grade ten students, 72% of grade eleven students and 80% of the grade twelve students prefer electronic media over print media. Our study also showed a gender effect on the use of electronic media.

Title: Empowering Students for a Digital World: Global Concerns, Local School

Evidence and Strategic Actions

Abstract: The research reported here is an evidence-based development project to identify students' perceptions of how confident and competent they are in learning and working effectively in an online world, and to develop local school strategic actions. It specifically examines students' knowledge about a range of digital competencies for online learning and living, and their confidence in using these. From a constructivist perspective, understanding their conceptions of their digital world and their confidence with engaging in it provides a window for ensuring that school libraries prepare students for this world. Available literature consistently shows that for today's young people, the digital environment is already a deeply embedded and pervasive aspect of their lives and the basis for their connections, communications, and community. Accordingly, this paper will present the findings of a school-based qualitative research study that, from the students' perspective, seeks to understand how confident they are with being safe and productive in the online world. It will also show how these findings translate into strategic actions for the local school.

Title: Reading, School Libraries and Equity: A Socio-Spatial Study of School Libraries and Reading in Singapore

Title: "It's like stickers in your brain": Using the Guided Inquiry Process to Support Lifelong Learning Skills in an Australian School Library

Abstract: The Guided Inquiry Design process (GID) is a model of information seeking behaviour emphasising elements of autonomy and reflection throughout students' research process and based on Kuhlthau's (1989a; 2004) Information Search Process (ISP). GID is timely in the Australian context as a way to support the new Australian curriculum emphasising inquiry learning but omitting a practical framework for implementing it. This study sought to investigate the experience of students engaged in two GI research projects in Year 7 History and Geography at an independent girls' school in an Australian urban area. Analysis of the data indicates rich and diverse interpretations of the GID process across participants. Freddo's comment "It's like stickers in your brain," the title of this paper, highlights the memorability of the stages of the GI process. The girls also noted rewarding responses through their learning of the content and skills and "had fun" in this project.

Title: The Role of School Librarians and Subject Teachers in Information Literacy

Education: An analysis of the gaps between the expected roles and actual practice

Presenter: Niwai, Fumie

Abstract: Information literacy education is one of objectives of school curriculum in Japan. School Librarians are expected to play an instructional role in the inquiry learning. Library instructions which have been worked on for many years cover all phases of inquiry learning such as planning, retrieving, processing, creating, sharing and evaluating. It includes various types of knowledge, skills, intellect, and attitudes. However, the results of interviewing 11 school librarians and 14 subject teachers have revealed that librarians actually teach no more than a portion of the contents that fall under the library instruction. The content primarily taught by librarians, and most subject teachers expected librarians to teach, is the traditional information skills, such as locating Information, using books, taking notes and showing references. School librarians should reconsider their expertise on information literacy education and share more responsibility with teachers to improve student learning.

Title: School Management Participation of Teacher Librarians: Proposal for the school library utilization based on the process of recognition formation process

Abstract: In Japan, one amendment of the School Library Act 5 of 2003 mandated that "Every school with more than 12 classes is required to have a teacher librarian". Unfortunately, however, this teacher librarian is not identified as "a full-timer." In many schools, teacher librarians are not only homeroom teachers but also teach classes in their speciality. Moreover, in 2014, the School Library Act was revised to require that every school have a school librarian. However, school librarians are usually part-timers. In addition, only 66.2% of primary schools, 62.6% of middle schools, and 81.4% of high schools employ teacher librarians. Only a little more than 40% of the schools employ both a teacher librarian and a school librarian...

Title: Using the image drawing method to examine advanced lectures of a teacher librarian program

Abstract: Previously, I examined changes in the pictures that university students drew of their school library over time while taking a course of school libraries. My lecture explained the importance of school libraries and in particular school librarians to future teachers (excluding school librarians). It was expected that if the lecture objectives had been achieved, the number of students who drew a librarian would increase compared with drawings done by these same students prior to taking part in the course. While my original students showed an increased tendency to draw a librarian, besides only 2 of 22 other teacher librarian courses revealed an increased tendency, the ratio of my students who depicted librarians was at the same level as that of the students in the teacher librarian courses, revealing that my lectures successfully communicated the importance of school librarians. So, the purpose of this study, to increase the reliability of the image drawing method, and apply to advanced lectures of teacher librarian program...

Title: Acquired but not Required?: the Gap between the Competency in Education and That in Action for School Librarianship

Abstract: This study confirms the gap between the competency of "school librarian" in education and that in action. The authors carried out the semi-structured interviews with eight persons who had experience of working as a school librarian. The authors asked them whether they thought that it was necessary to learn the competency in the list made by authors, and whether they utilized that at their works. As a result, most of the competencies was required at work, moreover, it was necessary to learn in education. According to their answers, the authors recognized following things. Firstly, there was little need to learn some competencies in the categories of library management and organization of materials. Secondly, the competencies about history, other types of library and school librarianship of foreign countries should be learned in education, though those were not utilized at work. Thirdly, the competency of pedagogy should be added to the list.

Title: Effect of library orientation on School libraries in Japan

Abstract: To make the better use of the school library, library orientation plays a very important role. Library orientation is not only teach students how to use the library, but also have effects the Life-long learning. This study aims to clarify the following two points; (1) whether the students remember or not about library orientation, (2) the effects of the library orientation in the school library. The data were collected via a questionnaire survey with 1,540 freshman belong to the university of Tsukuba. A total number of 226 (14.7%) survey responses were collected from the students. Literacy Model in the Siyabalanduwa Educational Zone, Sri Lanka

Title: The school library is mine, too! A participatory approach involving students to rethink their library in a grammar high school in Rome

Presenter: Marquardt, Luisa

Abstract: A study was carried out in 2015 in a Grammar High School in Rome on students' and teachers' engagement in rethinking and redesigning their school library. Action research and a participatory approach were chosen. Meetings and a basic course in school librarianship were held. Two directions were then taken: organizational (library renovation based on decisions made by the workgroup) and exploratory. Data were collected through a questionnaire (4 areas: demographic; reading; library; comments) designed, tested, adjusted and then administered (May-June 2015) to the selected sample of students and the whole population of teaching and non-teaching staff. Students' main findings: correlation between the individual background and students' reading habits; favorite genre (fantasy), subject (psychology), format (print; 70% reads printed books, 28% e-books); scarce usage of public and school library; wish list: sofas, armchairs, computers, wall decorations. Students' expectations and suggestions have been taken in account in redesigning the school library. The intervention helped in transforming a book storage room into a lively learning commons.

Abstract: The Schools Catalogue Information Service (SCIS) is a business division of the government-owned not-for-profit company Education Services Australia (ESA). SCIS provides schools with access to a database of high quality, consistent catalogue records created according to national and international standards. SCIS reduces the cost and duplication of effort of cataloguing resources and supplies MARC records to schools in the Asia-Pacific region, including over 93% of Australian schools. This workshop looks at use of a centralised bibliographic database that has been created specifically to support school libraries. This will include of how SCIS's tightly-controlled subject headings and authority files improve discovery for students and teachers. We provide an overview to the SCIS approach to subject-cataloguing, including how the Schools Online Thesaurus (ScOT) links resources and information needs in the school context.

Title: School Libraries in the English Education of Japan: From the Perspectives of

Abstract: In Japan, English has been taught as a foreign language. For surviving in the quickly changing 21st century, students have to learn English more autonomously, gathering authentic input by themselves. Though school libraries can be a solution to such problems, appeal to English educators is not sufficient and such educators do not fully understand the possibilities offered by school libraries. The voices of practitioners of English education who utilise school libraries were needed in this respect. This study shared the perspectives of practitioners, using interviews in order to reveal the potential uses of school libraries. The study concluded with the possibility that school libraries can form an English learning environment in which students' autonomy is cultivated and authentic input is provided.

Title: The Media and Information Literacy Program of the Ateneo de Manila Grade School Presenter: Dela Cruz, Maria Victoria E.

Abstract: The study was conducted to measure the effectiveness of the Media Instruction Program (MIP) of the Ateneo de Manila Grade School through the MIP Modules taught to selected Grade Five students enrolled for SY 2015-2016. Students were given a pre-test at the beginning of SY 2015-2016 to measure their information literacy skills. After attending MIP sessions at the Katigbak Educational Media Center (KEMC), they were given post-test to measure the difference in their pre-test and post-test scores. There was an observed increase and significant improvement in the test scores of Grade Five students after they have been exposed to Media Instruction Program.

Title: Professional work and learning with smartphones: a comparative study of school librarians from Australia, Hong Kong and United Kingdom

Presenters: Dukic, Zvjezdana & Tam, Annie

Abstract: The study explores the role of mobile technologies in school librarians' daily work and professional learning and development. The aim of the study is to examine how school librarians search, access, use and share information via their smartphones, what smartphone functionalities they use for these purposes, and what apps and social media are most frequently used. The study is based on empirical research conducted on a sample of school librarians/teacher librarians in Australia, Hong Kong and United Kingdom. Data were collected

with online survey. The major finding of this study is that school librarians in Australia and Hong Kong widely use smartphone technologies for their daily needs and for professional work and learning. Various smartphone functionalities tools are used to satisfy these varied needs. Also school librarians from Hong Kong use various smartphone functionalities more frequently than study participants from Australia and UK. Barriers to smartphone use are also discussed but it seems that they do not detract school librarians from using smartphone technologies for their daily professional activities.

Title: Evaluation of Digital Contents in Education: Examples of English and Health Education Applications in Japan

Abstract: In recent years, new school education using tablet personal computers has become an important issue in Japanese society. In the future, in schools all over the country, virtually all children will own tablets. Paper-based textbooks and teaching materials will be partially or completely transposed to digital form. In the open-stack reference room, researchers can access to about 40,000 of children's books and materials. On the first floor of an old brick building, which was built in 1906 and recently designated as one of the Historical Architecture in Tokyo, there are rooms called "Children's Library" and "Meet the World". On the second floor, there is a room for study specially for junior high and high school students called "Shirabemono-no-heya (Room for research)" where they can find books useful for their research study. Also there is a gallery called "Jidosho Gallery (Children's

With a concept of "a school library that grows zest for living, dreams and hopes", the library is seeking school children to grow their minds and self-learning ability, and citizens to pick up learning habit through their lives. Ichikawa City built up an original interlibrary loan system and utilized it for supporting school curriculums. Also we conducted training program for librarianteachers and school librarians about school library managements, which contributed to teachers' skills.
